HCF Business Scholarship Program

Eligibility Criteria:

Must be a U.S. citizen of Hispanic background residing in the 50 states or Puerto Rico

Must be pursuing a business, computer science, engineering, or business-related major

Must be starting as a college freshman, sophomore, junior or senior by Fall 2003

Must plan to enroll as a full-time undergraduate student (minimum 12 credits per semester) from the fall of 2003 through the spring of 2004

Must be applying to or be enrolled in a college or university in the 50 states or Puerto Rico

Must be in good academic standing with a cumulative grade point average of no less than a 3.0 on a 4.0 scale.

National Hispanic Explorers Scholarship Program

Eligibility Criteria:

Must be a U.S. citizen of Hispanic background residing in the 50 states or Puerto Rico

Must be pursuing a science, computer science, engineering or NASA-related major

Must be starting as a college freshman, sophomore, junior or senior by Fall 2003

Must plan to enroll as a full time undergraduate student from the fall of 2003 through the spring of 2004

Must be applying to or be enrolled in a college or university in the 50 states or Puerto Rico

Must be in good academic standing with a cum grade point average of no less than a 3.0 on a 4.0 scale

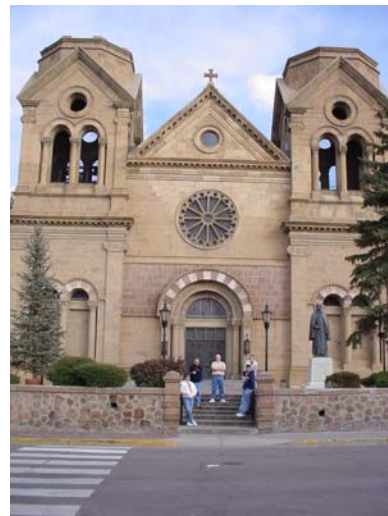
UNM & Santa Fe Trip
