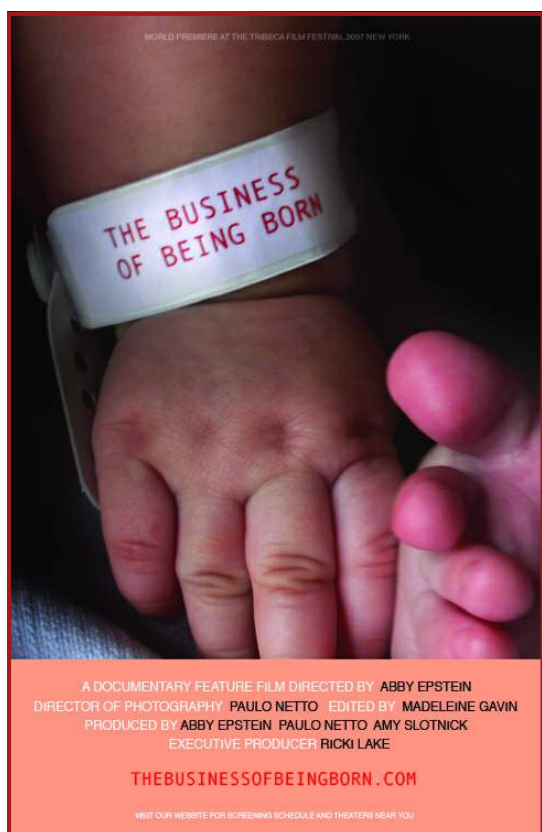

## Sneak Peak of Documentary *Business of Being Born* at SJC

November 8,

Say the word “choice” to a group of people discussing reproductive rights and you might watch the crowd part automatically into two very opinionated and divided camps. This is undoubtedly the case if the issue at stake is abortion, but what if it’s birth itself? The discussion might turn quickly to choice of obstetrician, choice of pain killer, choice of diaper brand or formula. According to midwives, midwifery advocates and some childbearing women and their families, this tendency to frame birth choices within the medical model is shortsighted at best. In fact, many believe that allowing obstetricians in hospitals to manage care according to the status quo might actually put women and their babies in danger.

Filmmakers Ricki Lake and Abby Epstein tackle this issue in their new documentary, *The Business of Being Born*. A free sneak preview of this film will take place Thursday, November 8 at 7 p.m. in the Little Theater at San Juan College.

Recently shown at the Tribeca Film Festival, this film addresses the medical model of birth and the common interventions that are part of routine care for pregnant women under obstetric care. Drawing upon their own personal experiences of pregnancy and birth, the filmmakers

- In sub-Saharan Africa the number of hungry people has increased by some 20% since 1996.
- Over 200 million people in sub-Saharan Africa – more than a third of the population – are hungry.

The purpose of the banquet is to raise awareness about the hunger that millions of people face everyday. Choosing a career path can be challenging for both high school and college students. Many may not have a clear picture about potential salaries or even how much education they'll need to get the job of their choice. Area high school juniors and seniors and San Juan College students will have the opportunity to get answers to these questions and more at *Career Check, Tuesday, November 13, from 9 a.m. to noon, in the Henderson Fine Arts Center.*

At this one-day event, students can visit with more than 50 community business professionals working in 16 career clusters ranging from agriculture to finance, business and communications, to health sciences. San Juan College faculty will also be on hand to discuss the educational opportunities for various careers

“The fact is many young students often head into a career without a solid understanding of what the job requires from a physical, mental or educational standpoint,” explains Marie Schumacher, director of Career Services at San Juan College. “Then, after spending a great deal of time and money on training and education, they find out that they really aren’t well-suited for the job.”

“*Career Check* is not a job fair,” she continues. “This is much more – it’s an opportunity for students to do some ‘career investigation,’ and get a realistic picture of the day-to-day realities of their job and help them consider all the options before making a career choice.”

Many complications ensue including the growing love between Cladwell’s daughter, Hope, and the revolutionary Bobby Strong. *Urinetown, the musical* moved to Broadway in September of 2001 and was nominated for 10 Tony Awards in 2002.

not only turn the camera upon themselves but also upon the mothers and their care providers who face the important decisions about where, how and with whom to give birth.

Dr. Marsden Wagner, a former director of Women's and Children's Health, World Health Organization, is quoted in the film saying, "The point here is there's not a good history in obstetric practice of careful study of the long term effects of all these interventions. This is why, if you really want a humanized birth, the best thing to do is to get the hell out of the hospital."

The filmmakers explore Dr. Wagner's unusual policy position that turns conventional wisdom equating hospitals with safety on its head. It also explores the reasons why so few people might agree with this position. In doing so, the film touches upon the medical-industrial complex in light of the relationships between hospitals, the American Medical Association and insurance companies to try to uncover the reasons why birth is managed the way it is and why so few midwives work in hospitals.

The women of San Juan County, while facing slightly different challenges than the women highlighted in *The Business of Being Born*, nonetheless must reconcile their needs for safe choices in birth providers and settings with their increasingly limited options.

In a city with one hospital, women who choose obstetric care, choose to be managed by a system that prizes numerous interventions. These interventions usually begin with pharmaceutical induction of the birth. This intervention often leads to subsequent medication for pain relief, beginning what many call a "cascade of interventions" that many times ends in a surgical birth. In this setting, women who have experienced cesarean birth once are denied the option to birth subsequent children vaginally (otherwise known as VBAC or vaginal birth after cesarean).

Furthermore, women are also denied access to an entire class of providers, nurse-midwives, because of local hiring restrictions. Typically, nurse-midwives advocate for fewer medical interventions as the core philosophy of this approach centers around viewing birth as a natural process. Those desiring nurse-midwifery care within a hospital setting must travel out of town and attempt to find a provider who will take new patients. For those few women who desire an out-of-hospital birth assisted by a certified professional midwife (CPM), a class of independent providers trained to safely attend such births, options in this county are equally limited.

As awareness of the issues surrounding birth develop, more childbearing women and their families will develop the advocacy skills necessary to ensure that their birth experience is managed with dignity, respect *and* commitment to safety. Such awareness is the explicit goal of this film. According to a prepared statement, "The filmmakers hope *The Business of Being Born* will ultimately play a role in health-care reform and raise awareness of the options for parents of the future. They also hope to enlighten and inspire parents to advocate for themselves and to 'own' their birth experience wherever it takes place."

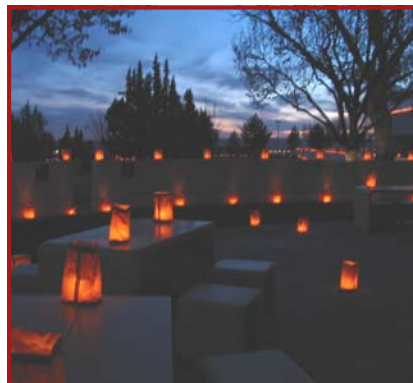

- ✧ Original display started with only 10 students and 2200 luminarias and the display has grown to 50,000 luminarias.
- ✧ 1992: the only time that the display was cancelled due to bad weather., although we had a little scare last year when the wind decided to whip through the four corners just as lighting had started.
- ✧ For 29 years, the community of San Juan County has come to expect the college's annual Luminarias display.
- ✧ Luminarias is full of community celebration, alongside San Juan College students, staff and faculty; the following groups help bring the event to life: City of Farmington, Police Department, Farmington Public Schools, Red Cross, and countless community volunteers.
- ✧ Over 10,000 people attend the luminarias display at San Juan College in Farmington, NM. It is the largest luminarias display in state of New Mexico sponsored by a non-profit organization.
