

RUSSIAN

RUSS-111 Elem Russian I 3 cr.
The purpose of this beginning course is to develop listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills to communicate at a basic level. The course will use a communicative approach to cover the fundamentals of basic vocabulary, grammar, conversation and culture. Prerequisites: APEN 40+ and APRD 39+ or permission of instructor. Semester offered: Fall, Spring.

RUSS-112 Elementary Russian II 3 cr.
A continuation of RUSS 111, Elementary Russian I. Prerequisite: RUSS 111 or permission of instructor. Semester offered: Fall, Spring.

SAFETY

SAFE-111 Safety "BEST" Awareness 0.5
Satisfies the minimum safety training required by most companies found in an industry that requires man and machine to co-exist. Covers safety topics common to all industries.

SAFE-113 Confined Space-First Aid/CPR 0.5
For the entrant and attendant; the information and instructions will satisfy the minimum safety training required by most companies for participants to work in confined space operations. Will review the Code of Federal Regulations 1910.146 as they pertain to confined space operations and define the true intent of the regulations. Includes first aid and CPR.

SAFE-114 HAZ WOPER 24 Hour 2 cr.
Will satisfy the Code of Federal Regulations 1910.120 covering a technician for emergency response standards. The information on chemicals and hazardous waste products will be discussed and the proper procedures on how to address these products.

SAFE-115 HAZ WOPER Refresher 0.5 cr.
This course (8 hours) will satisfy the annual refresher requirements for the certifications on prior training (24 and 40 Haz Woper) and the Code of Federal Regulations 1910.120 concerning personnel working in hazardous waste sites and/or remediation zones for a technician for emergency response standards.

SAFE-116 First Aid/CPR 0.5 cr.
Designed to introduce the student to good practices when attempting to respond to medical emergencies. Emergency Medical Planning is the certifying agency for instructors and instructor trainers. The instruction includes CPR and first aid through the continuing circle of patient care.

SAFE-118 Forklift Certification 0.5 cr.
Focuses on discussion of safe operating practices. Passing an operator driving skills evaluation on a forklift is required by each individual to complete the training.

SAFE-119 Defensive Driving Course 0.5 cr.

SAFE-122 Excavation/Trenching 0.5 cr.

SAFE-130 Initial Safety Training 0.5 cr.
This program will teach company employees company policies and procedures, safety practices, site specific requirements, drug and alcohol policies, and work area duties.

SAFE-134 Lockout Tagout Authorized Employee 0.5 cr.
Study of requirements for conducting proper Lockout/Tagout procedures to become an "authorized" employee. Course will focus on related definitions, OSHA regulatory requirements, and recordkeeping/training requirements.

SAFE-135 Lockout Tagout Affected Employee 0.5 cr.
Study of recognizing hazardous energy sources, signs required for Lockout/Tagout, and gain the ability to recognize the danger of the unplanned hazardous energy release.

SAFE-139 Composite Safety Training 3 cr.
Composite safety week.

SAFE-142 Initial Safety and H2S 0.5 cr.

SAFE-158 SJBOSC Safety Training 0.5 cr.
This course will provide instruction information pertinent to San Juan Basin Operator Safety Council (SJBOSC) safety procedures necessary for contractors to safely work on operator locations.

SAFE-160 SJBOSC Awareness 0.5 cr.
This course will provide students with the basic San Juan Basin Operators Safety Council (SJBOSC) awareness requirements for Personal Protective Equipment, Fall Protection, Lockout/Tagout, Confined Space Entry, Hot Work, and Ground Disturbance.

SAFE-161 SJBOSC Comprehensive 0.5 cr.
This course will provide students with the comprehensive San Juan Basin Operators Safety Council (SJBOSC) requirements for conducting proper Air Monitoring, Confined Space Entry, and Hot Work.

Occupational Safety

SAFE-250 Management of Safety Work 2 cr.
Course presents theories and principles of safety regulatory issues and their practical uses in the workplace. This course focuses on providing practical input about design ergonomics, desired safety features, and human factors.

SAFE-251 Hazard Communication and Right-To-Know 1 cr.
Provides information to workers and employers about various chemical hazards that exist in the workplace, and what protective measures they can take in order to prevent the adverse effects of such hazards.

SAFE-252 Environmental Management 2 cr.
Course introduces environmental management issues, programs, and regulations. An in-depth look is provided for these specific topics: Air Pollution Control and Mitigation, Water and Wastewater, Solid Waste, Hazardous Waste, Hazardous Materials Spills and Responses, and various management systems for environmental management.

SAFE-253 Safety and Health Training 1 cr.
The objective of this course is to learn how to assess, develop, carry out, and evaluate a training program. Regulatory issues will be explained as well as the theory of training, needs assessment and development of a program.

SAFE-254 Worker's Compensation 1 cr.
Course provides an understanding of workers' compensation laws and regulatory issues. An understanding of WC policies will be explained and how premiums are calculated.

SAFE-255 Fleet Safety 1 cr.
Provides an understanding to DOT, OSHA and other regulations are related to fleet safety. Also, addresses vehicles and accidents, and vehicle engineering and ergonomics. Tools are provided on how to pave the way to a safer, more dependable and cost-effective fleet.

SAFE-256 Risk Assessment and Hazard Control 3 cr.
Course provides an understanding of risk management principles and regulatory issues in the context of safety and health management.

SAFE-257 Emergency Preparedness 1 cr.
Course addresses emergency preparedness and management. Also, covers all aspects of planning for, and recovering from, a disaster.

SAFE-258 Fire Prevention and Protection 2 cr.
Examine measures directed toward avoiding the inception of fire, among which are fire prevention education, fire safety inspection, fire codes, and investigation of fire to determine causes. Provides an overview of fire protection and fire loss analysis.

SAFE-259 Industrial Hygiene 2 cr.
Course provides an introduction to the practice of industrial hygiene. Also, covers history, regulations, basic principles, standards, and measurements.

SAFE-260 Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) 1 cr.
Course provides knowledge concerning the proper selection, care and use of personal protective equipment. Students will be presented the requirements for compliance and the role of PPE in controlling exposure to hazards in the workplace.

SAFE-261 Ergonomics and Human Factors 1 cr.
Course reviews the principles and practices of ergonomics in a working environment. The focus is on the human operator and their effective functioning in such an environment.

BLAW-263 Occupational Safety Law 1 cr.
This is a general overview of the laws as applied to and concerning the management of occupational safety and health, specifically Worker's Compensation and broadly the Occupational Health and Safety Act.

SOCIOLOGY

SOCI-110 Introduction to Sociology 3 cr.
The study of human groups, the social arrangements that people

create, the many ways of being human, and the changing world in which we live. Prerequisites: APEN 070+ or ENGL 095; APRD 058+ or RDNG 095. Semester offered: Fall, Spring and Summer. [NM Common Course Number SOCI 1113, Area IV; Behavioral/Social Science Core]

SOCI-210 Social Problems 3 cr.
An introduction to contemporary problems in American society to include such topics as crime, prejudice, drug use, aging and the changing family structure. Prerequisites: SOCI 110 or SOCI 213; APEN 070+ or APRD 058+. Semester offered: On Demand. [NM Common Course Number SOCI 2113, Area IV: Social/Behavioral Core]

SOCI-211 Deviant Behavior 3 cr.
Analysis of behavior that deviates from institutional expectations, by using specific sociological theory and method. Topics such as drug and alcohol abuse, mental illness, criminal behavior, and sexual deviance will be discussed. Prerequisites: SOCI 110 or SOCI 213, APEN 070+ or APRD 058+. Introduction to Sociology. Semester offered: Fall.

SOCI-212 Juvenile Delinquency 3 cr.
An overview of prevalent theories of causes, distribution, and frequency of delinquency will be discussed. In addition, the legal system for processing juvenile offenders in the United States will be analyzed. Special consideration will be given to the juvenile justice system in New Mexico. Prerequisites: SOCI 110 or SOCI 213; APEN 070+ or APRD 058+. Introduction to Sociology. Semester offered: Spring.

SOCI-213 Intro to Criminal Justice System 3 cr.
An analysis of the criminal justice process in the United States. Special emphasis will be placed on law enforcement, probation and parole, and the courts. Prerequisites: APEN 070+ or ENGL 095; APRD 058+ or RDNG 095. Semester offered: Fall and Spring.

SOCI-215 Sociology of Marriage and Family 3 cr.
Introduction to American marriage and family, focusing primarily on foundations of family as an institution. Students will be given an opportunity to complete individual or group research on an elective stage of the family life cycle. Prerequisites: SOCI 110 or HMSV 111; APEN 070+ or APRD 058+. Semester offered: On Demand. [NM Common Course Number SOCI 2213, Area IV: Social/Behavioral Core]

SOCI-220 Human Sexuality 3 cr.
The psychological and social aspects of human sexuality are explored in the context of the life span, including sexual attitude formation and maintenance; sexuality as a lifetime process; sexual rules and customs; the physical, psychological, social, and spiritual involved in personal sexual developmental behavior; and sexual health. Prerequisites: SOCI 110; APEN 070+ or APRD 058+. Semester offered: On Demand.

SOCI-225 Race and Ethnic Relations 3 cr.
Dynamics of prejudice and discrimination and historic and contemporary patterns of race and ethnic interaction in the United States will be explored. Attention will focus on factors impacting groups that live in the Southwest. Prerequisites: SOCI 110 or SOCI 213, HMSV 111 or HMSV 220, ENGL 111, RDNG 113 or APRD 081+. Semester offered: Spring.
